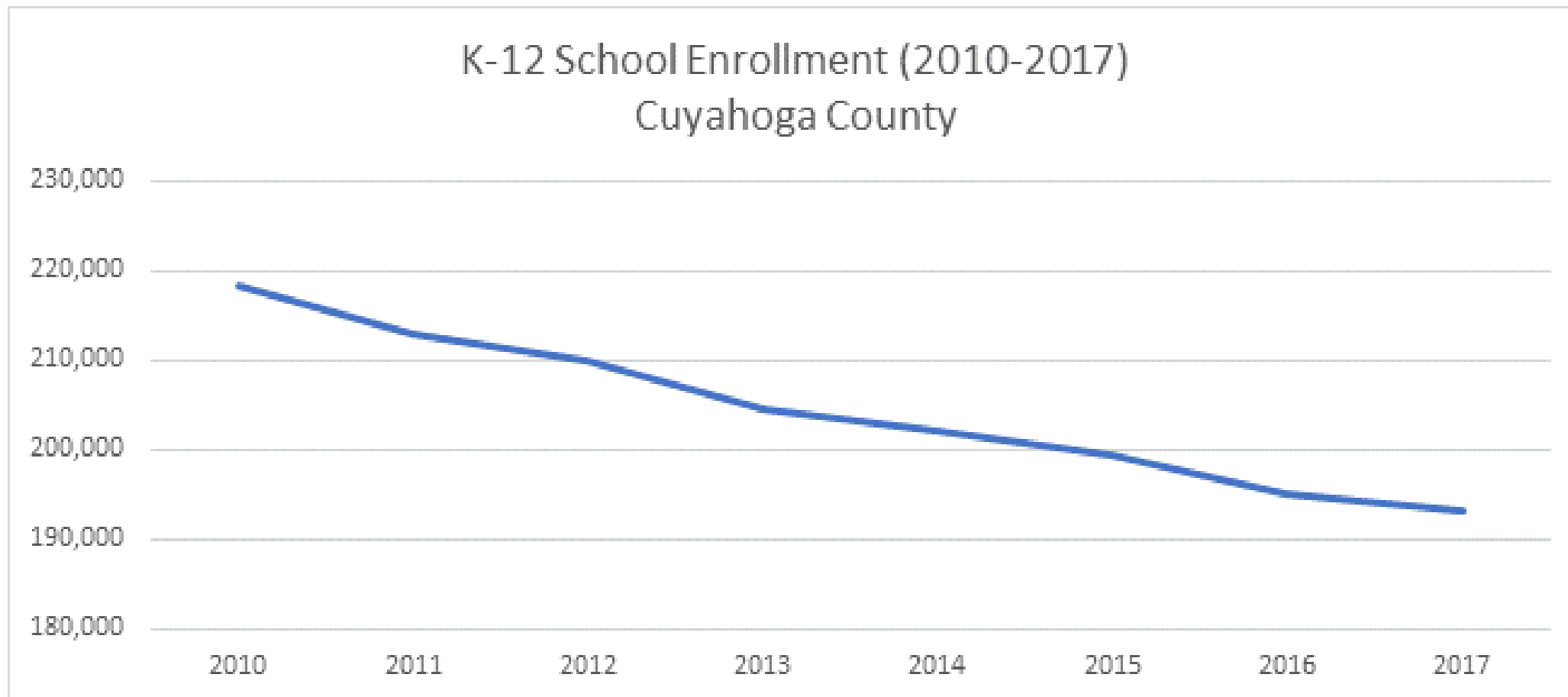

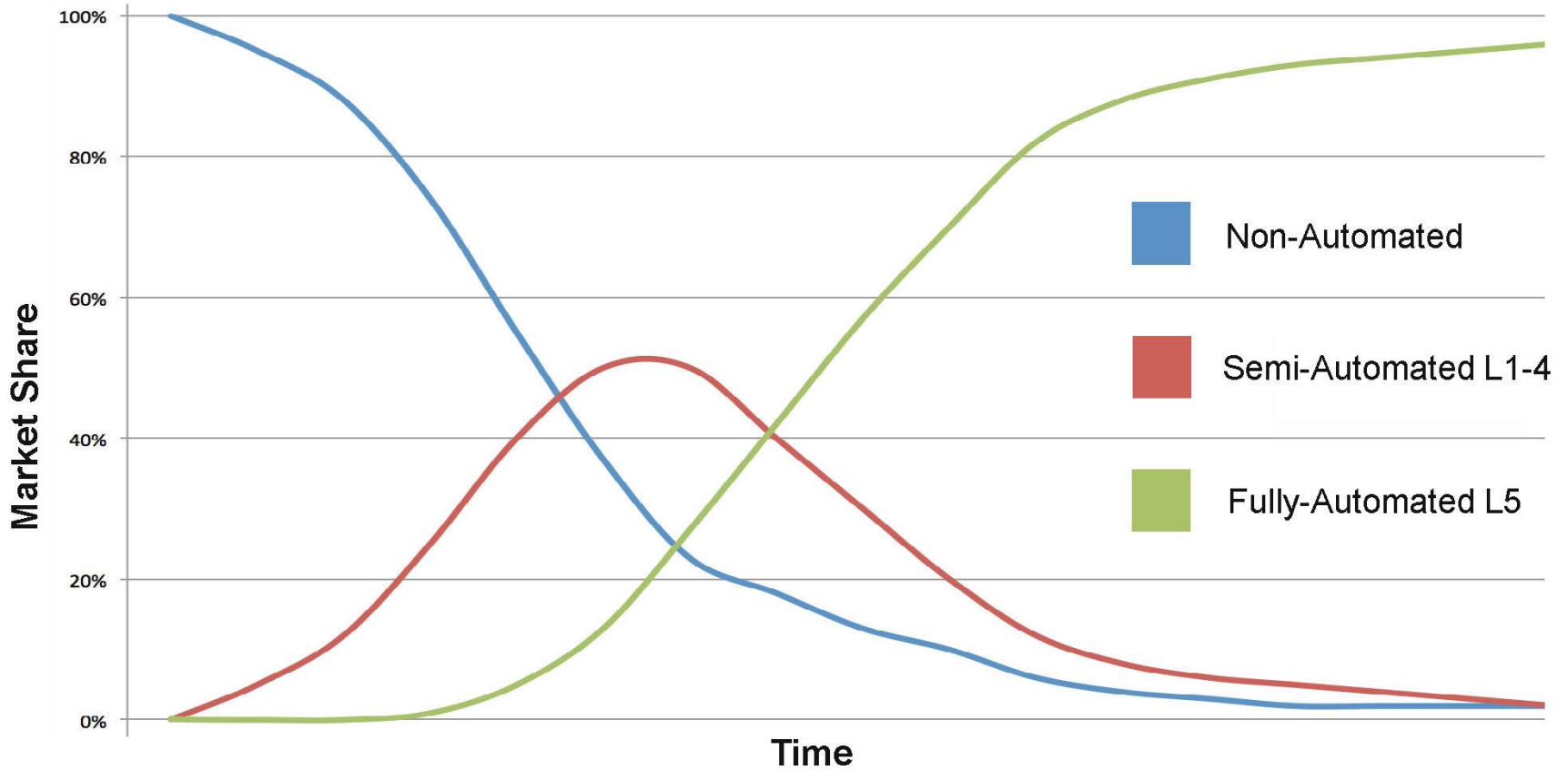

- 10 Better connect people to jobs



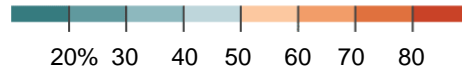

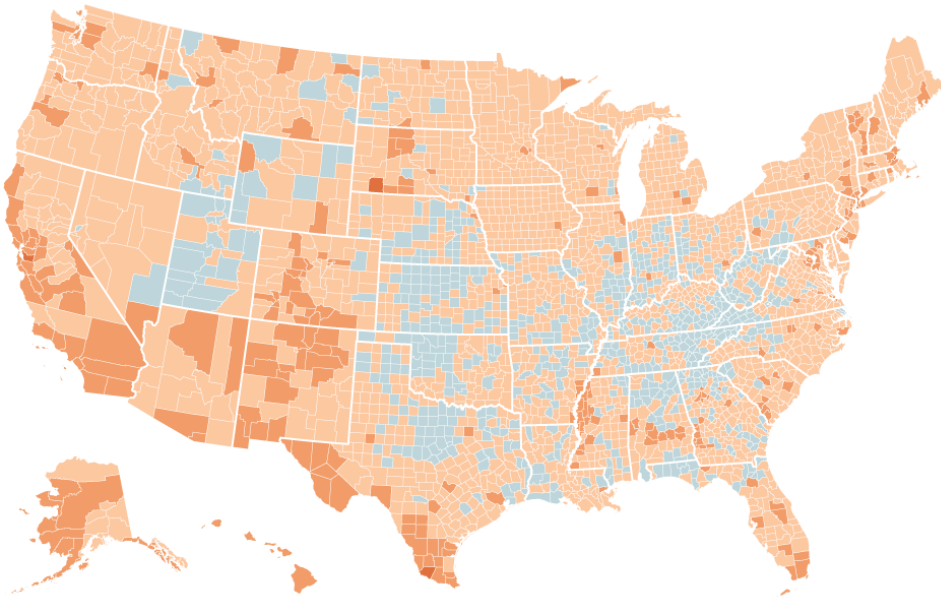

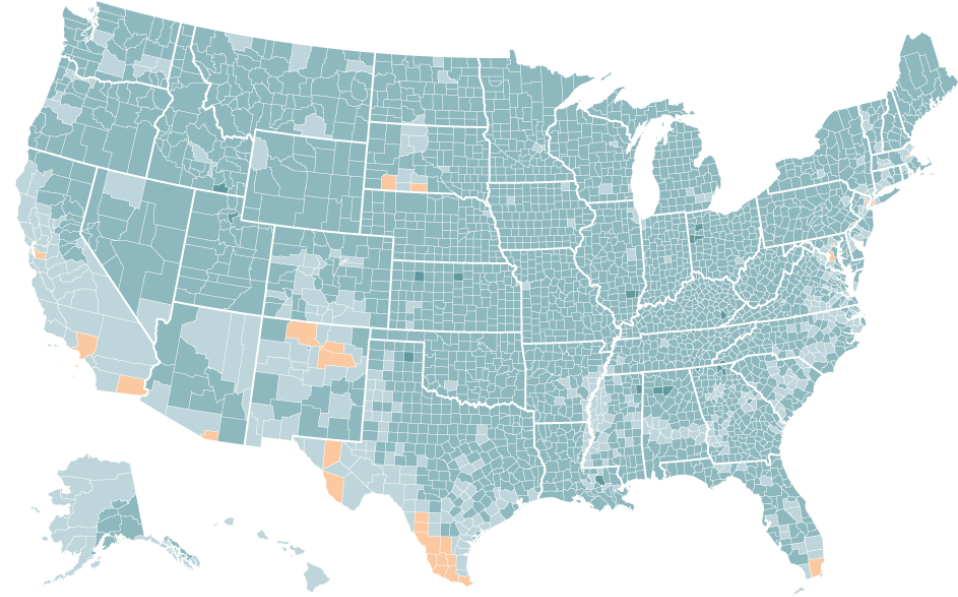
Percentage of adults per county who think... . . .

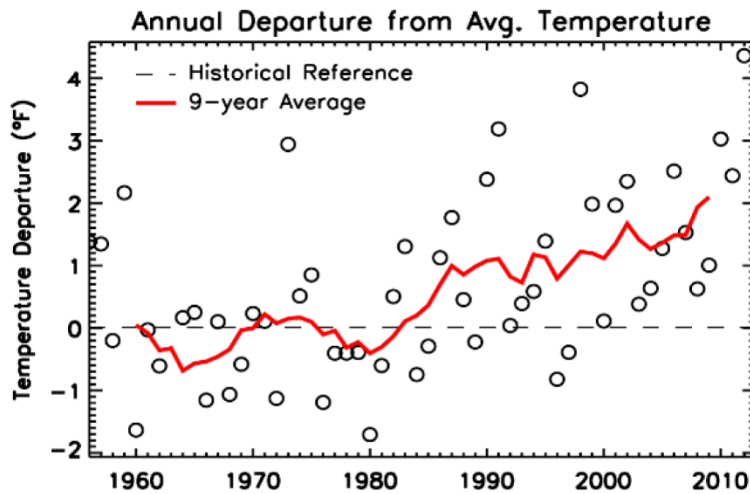


Global warming will harm people in the United States

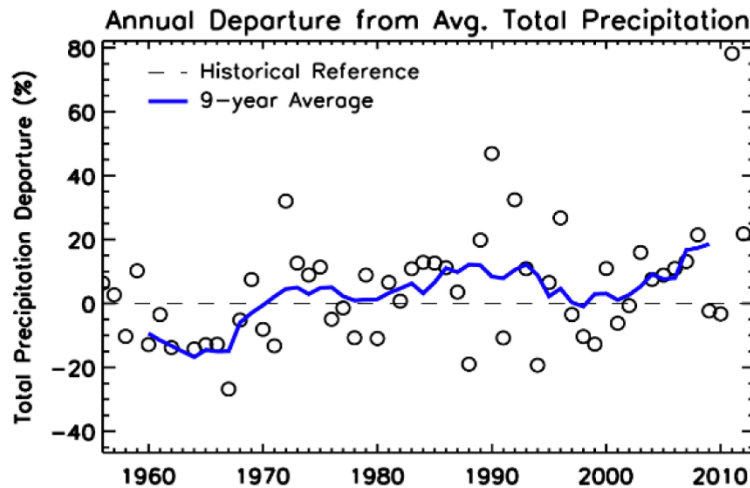


Global warming will harm me, personally





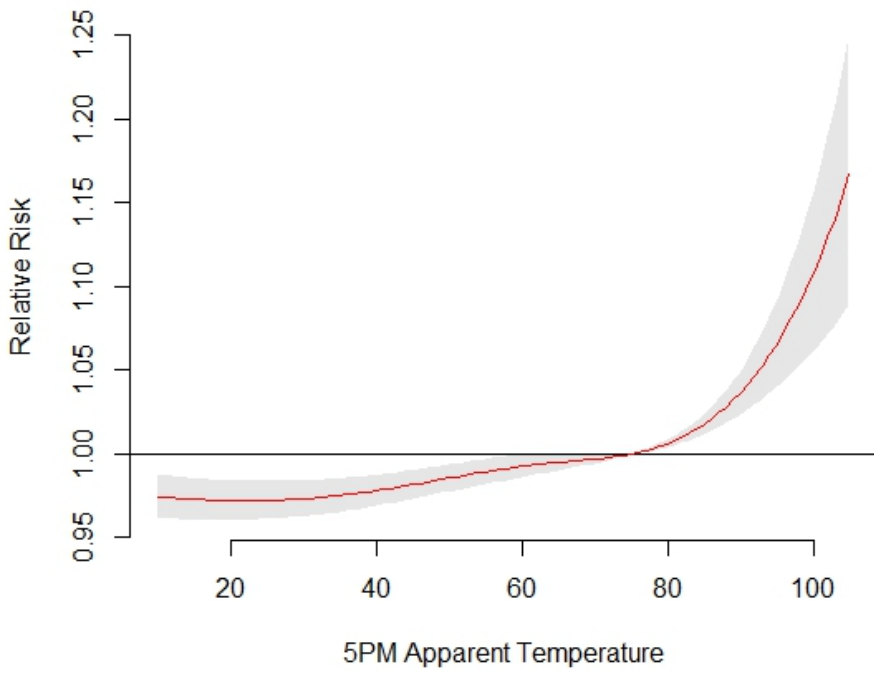
Annual average temperatures in Cleveland warmed by 2.4 degrees from 1956 to 2012, roughly three times faster than the national average.



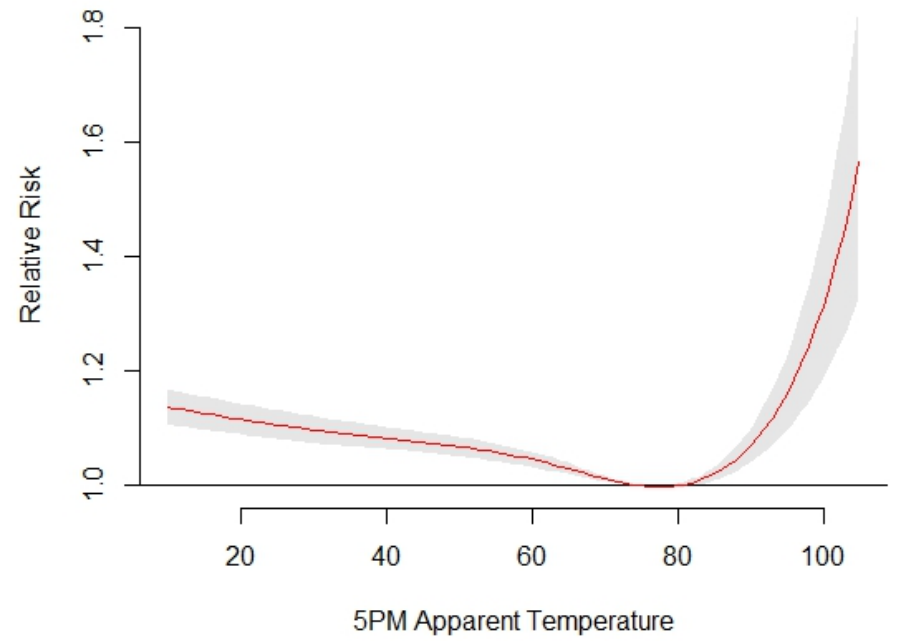
Annual precipitation totals rose 25.8% from 1956-2012. Autumn (Sept. – Nov.) precipitation increased by 57.4%.

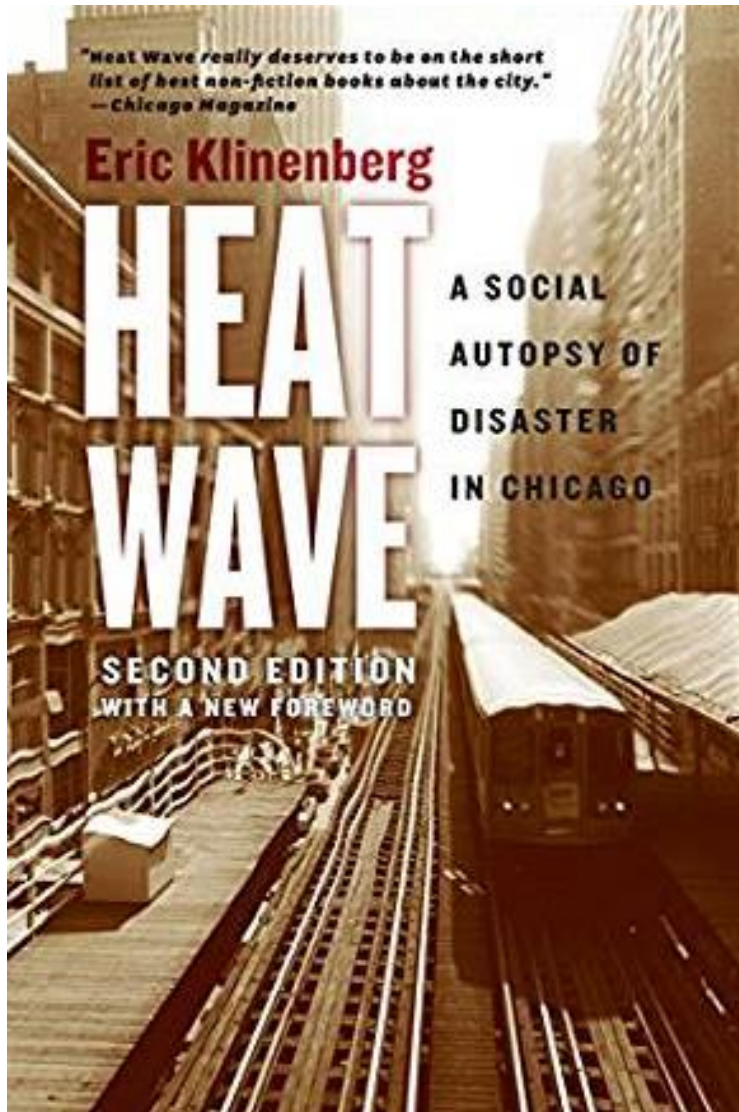
Climate-related threats in Northeastern Ohio include severe storms, flooding, lake effect snow, tornadoes, temperature extremes, and erosion/landslides.

Overall Mortality, 0-day effects only

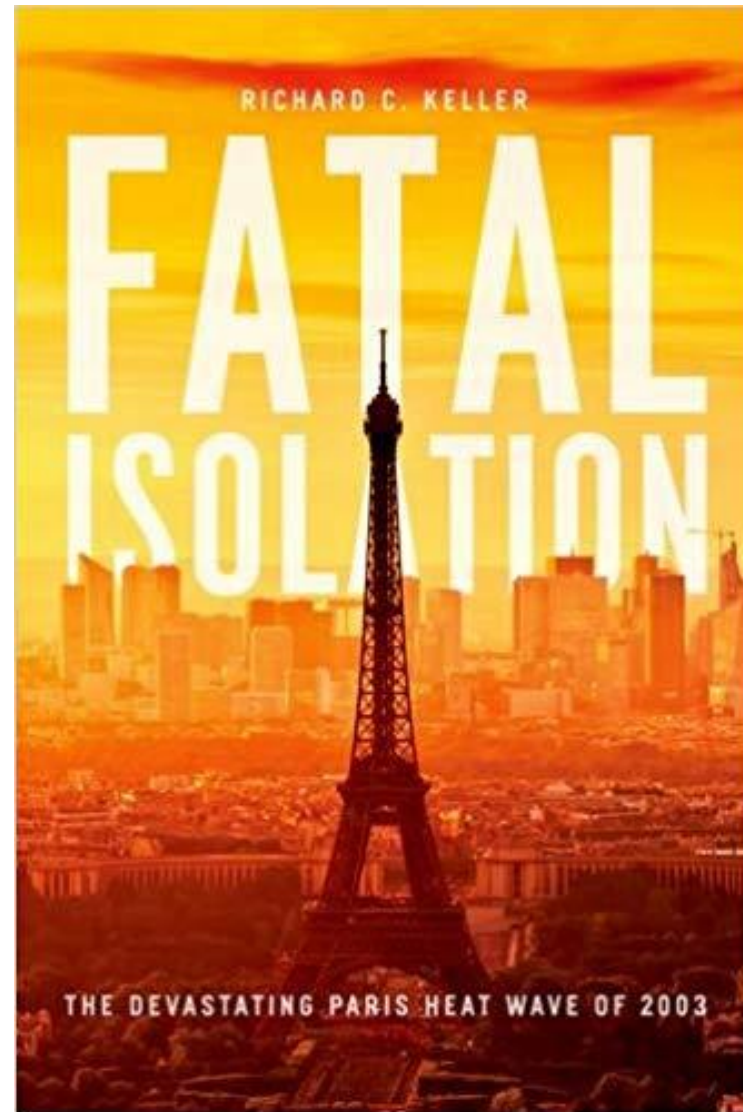


Overall Mortality, 14-day cumulative effect

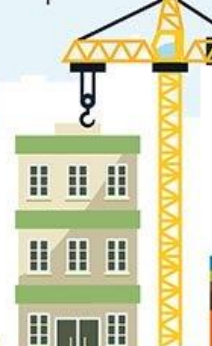

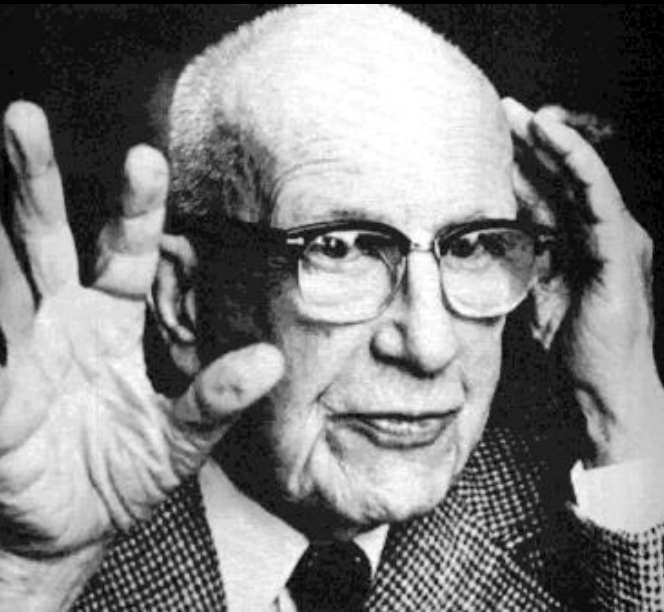

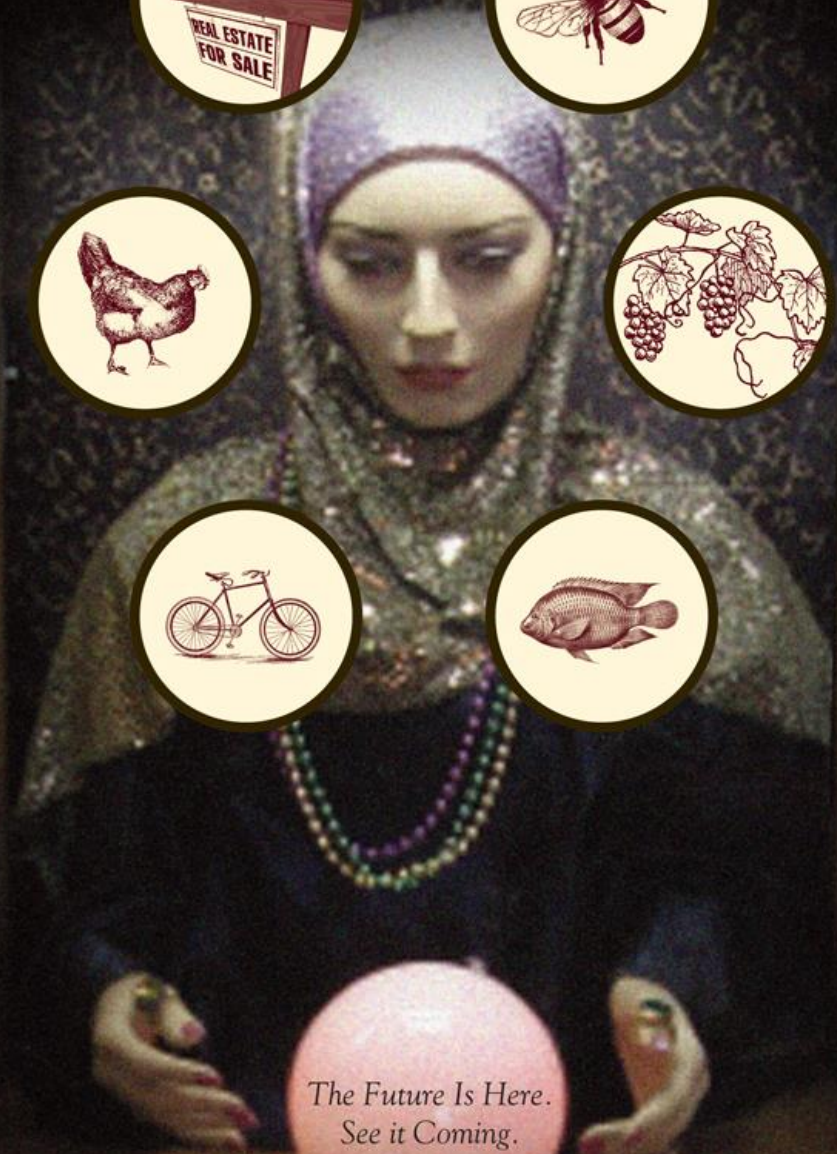
